### Subjects ARABIZATION.

In Regulation 20 of the Public Service Commission (General)
Regulations, 1965, which appeared in the Aden Gazette No. 70 of 28th
October, 1965, as Government Notice No.171 of 1965, it reads as follows:

20-(1). The Commissioner, in giving advice to the High Commissioner, shall at all times have regard to the maintenance of the high standard necessary in the Public Service and shall!

(a). In the case of appointments to, and promotions (underlining always mine) with-in the Public Service, give preference to South Arabian candidates who possess the requisite qualifications; and

(b). in the case of officers in the Public Service take into account qualifications, experience and merit before seniority in the service.

In the Establishments Circular No. 17/65 dated 30th October 1965, headed "Preference in Premotion for South Arabians," the following extract is being reproduced:-

4.(2)(b). On replacement by a South Arabian.

If a Permanent Secretary/Read of Department considers that there is a qualified South Arabian suitable for appointment to a post or for promotion within his Ministry/Department, but there is no post vacant, he shall refer the matter to the Director of Establishments who, on behalf of the High Commissioner will then consult the Public Service Commission. Similarly the Director of Establishments may initiate such consultation of his own volition. If, following such consultation, the High Commissioner is satisfied that there is a suitably qualified South Arabian but no vacancy into which to appoint/promote him, the Director of Establishments will write through the Parament Secretary/Head of Department to each non-South Arabian whether in the Ministry/Department which may have initiated the matter or another one, who holds a post to which the South Arabian concerned might be appointed/promoted, enquiring if any of them would wish to retire to make way for the South Arabian.

From the first extract the following two points will emerge:-

- (i). That preference will be given to South Arabians who possess the regulate qualifications.
  - (II). That the four factors determining the promotion of South Arabians have been arranged in the following order of importance:-
    - 1. Qualifications.
    - 2. Experience.
    - 3. Merit.
    - 4. Seniority.

In other words, these Regulations make Qualifications as the foremost determining factor.

- II. From the second extract the following fundamental points will also emerge:-
  - (1). There is emphasis again on the <u>qualified</u> South Arabian and <u>a suitably qualified</u> South Arabian.
  - (ii). That according to the Arabization Scheme, the aromotion of a qualified South Arabian would now be possible to be made ofther within his own Repartment or outside it.

With Arabization now in full swing, it is anticipated that Recommendation for the Arabization of the post of Reputy Permanent Recretary, Administration (the chief Educational Administrator of this Ministry) would soon be submitted to you for consideration. However, due to the present set-up of the Civil Service and its frequentation into a number of different and distinct tiets or be artmants, with much rigidity that it will not allow for the easy and free interchangeability of the staff between the lists, it is likely that the above recommendation for the filling of the post of B.P.S.(A) may exclude the name of another South Arabian who is the only one qualified in the subject of Educational Administration at a post-graduate level. He had in 1963 been sent by the Overpeas Training Board to the United Kingdom to obtain the Reading University Diploma in Educational Administration.

I am sure you will agree with me that a system which gives preference to the non-qualified over the qualified, especially at the present stage of our National Existence, when every effort should be made to make the best use of our limited trained man-power, is indeed a very bad system.

This should explain the fact why I am initiating action myself, and thus furnishing you with details of my qualifications and experience, the two factors most needed for any kind of promotion. As to the third detarmining factor i.e. merit - this I am leaving to my Mead of Department, ix whose judgement I have no reason to doubt.

Sir,

I have the honour to refer to your letter of 21st Narch, 1966, addressed to the Chairman of the Public Service Commission, through myself, requesting that consideration should be given to you being promoted on Arabisation grounds to fill the post of Deputy Permanent Secretary (Administration) in the Ministry of Education. I regret the delay in dealing with this matter, but your personal file has been in action of late in connection with offering you a transfer to the Pederal Public Service.

- The Chairman of the Public Service Commission does not receive applications in the manner of your letter from serving members of the Public Service. I am, therefore, not forwarding your letter but would like to point out certain matters in reply to it.
- 3. In the middle of page 2 of your letter you decry the present "fragmentation (of the Civil Service) into a number of different and distinct lists or Departments". This is a subject upon which there are strongly opposing views. Certain professions are very jealoue that persons from outside their particular speciality should not be allowed to transfer into it, whereas other professions, and you would appear to support this view, consider that there should be further interchangeability between staff in different professions. The post of Deputy Permanent Secretary (Administration) was created at the time of the Aden Ministry of Education becoming, with the States Branch, part of the larger Federal Ministry of Education. This post was intended to be filled by a person with purely administrative qualifications and it is not a post for a professional educationalist, even though that officer may have administrative training. If that post is to be Arabised, it would be filled by a South Arabian officer from the Administrative General Liet.
- 4. If you wish to leave your profession as an Educationalist and become an Administrative Officer, you can do so in either of two ways:-
  - (i) You can request an interdepartmental transfer, i.e., from Education to Administration, in accordance with the terms of Regulation 15 of the Public Service Commission (Procedure) Regulations, and if this is approved you would then become an Administrative Officer in Scale Al-2 and would be considered for promotion in that list alongside the Administrative Officers Class IV, i.e., Scale Al-2, who are already in that list.
  - (ii) You could answer an advertiggment circulated by the Public Service Commission advertising potentially vacant posts in the Administrative General List with a view to filling them with officers in General Lists or Departments other than Administration if in fact the Public Service Commission is satisfied that the vacancies in the Administrative General List cannot be filled by




### the promotion of officers within that list.

This latter alternative would only become available in the event of the Commission being satisfied in this manner and advertising the post, and I am not in a position to say whether or not this will in fact occur.

5. Finally, I can assure you that the Public Service Commission and my Department are fully conversant with the terms of Establishment Circular No.17/65 and the Public Service Commission Regulations, and everything possible is being done to speed up the process of Arabisation where there are suitably qualified South Arabian officers available, either to fill vacancies or to replace non-South Arabian officers. You may rest assured that your qualifications are known and that your suitability for advancement will not be overlooked.

Dear Sir,

When officers are made to discharge full responsibilities of higher posts they have the opportunity to demonstrate their ability in these higher responsibilities and so qualify themselves for promotion. As a matter of fact the Public Service Commissioner has ofter stated in several of the important advertisments that preference would be given to those who have had experience of acting in higher posts. Is there any reason, therefore, why I should not be given a chance to act as the Regional Director of Education (Aden) in the absence of the substansive holder on leave?

In this connection I would like to mention the following two points.

- (i) Last year the Director of Establishments did not accept the Ministry's proposal for the new creation of the post of Assistant Director of Education mainly because such a creation would result-as he has stated-in the deprivation of other officers from getting an opportunity to act in place of the two directors when the latter go on leave.
- (ii) One of the colleagues had within the scope of the last two years, been twice made to act in one of the above two posts during the absence of the substansive holder on leave.

Therefore, I hope that (a) the policy laid down by the Director of Establishments would be implemented and (b) similar treatment as that of (ii) above, be extended to other officers working under your kind direction.
